Michael Kinsella and Sons traded in Gorey from approximately 1870. The business traded in agricultural machinery and equipment as well as being a wholesale and retail grocery.

Alexander was born in 1860 and died in 1937. Upon his father, Michael's death, he took over the business. The 1901 census stated that Martin Kinsella, aged 42 lived here. He was a merchant and a brother of Alexander. The census of 1911 reported that he was a merchant, a farmer and a justice of the peace. He was also a town commissioner and a member of Wexford CC . In 1926, the building was described as a ruin. Alexander Kinsella's daughter married the local veterinary surgeon Mr Mernagh and they lived at Upper Main Street Gorey. Patrick Cooke owned the property using part of it. James Redmond used the other part as a slaughterhouse. The structure we see today was rebuilt in the 1940s.

From 1953, Patrick Kelly and Sons operated a furniture/ hardware store here. The premises was unoccupied for some time before Allied Irish Bank opened a branch.
