


The Duncan family were noted tradesmen involved in the building trades and especially in many areas of carpentry. They specialised in all types of joinery, cabinet making, wheelwrights and in 1880s spent time in the Undertaking business.

James Duncan subscribed £0-5s-0d to the fund for the planting of trees in the township of Gorey.




'Duncan Chairs' were quality pieces of furniture and may still be about. The Duncan family were and still are noted pipers.

Matthew Mulligan married Margaret Curran (nee Brown) on the 15th November 1915 and lived at No. 4 Main Street, Gorey.

The children were known as the Curran/Mulligans. Michael Mulligan died 15th May,1928 aged 44 years.He was buried in an oak coffin, brass mounted and lined. Motor hearse and 2 coaches from 4, Main Street to St. Michael's Cemetery. There were two insertions in The Irish Times and The Independent all costing £12-15-0. He was waked in own clothes – a suit. His wife Margaret died 23rd May,1949 aged 83 years. Both buried in St. Michael's Cemetery Gorey.

Patrick McDonald took over the premises in the 1930's. He was a family grocer, Teas, Corn, Seed and Wool Merchant. His daughter Agnes also worked in the shop. This was one of the old- time shops and Mrs. Mac had always a friendly chat with every customer. The Macs loved the Irish language.



Agnes died on the 18th May,1996, buried in St. Michael's Cemetery Gorey, headstone made by Kavanagh's of Gorey and erected by her niece Nuala.

In the early 1970's Laura Mansfield nee Sykes took over the premises as a Boutique.

Mrs. Laura Mansfield (Sykes) was born 25th April,1928 and died the 21^s January 1987 aged 59 and buried along with her husband in Christchurch Graveyard, Gorey.
