1853 - 1881

Occupied by George Willoughby a weaver. Leased from the Ram Estate.

George & Anne Willoughby married in 1852.

John Pinnions; Occupation Cattle Doctor married Anne Willoughby widow of George Willoughby .They leased premises from Ram Estate. Ann Pinnions /Willoughby died in 1895. In the 1901 census John Pinnions is listed as a widower aged 66 born in Kilmichael and of the Irish Church. John Pinnions is buried in Christchurch graveyard. Also Ellen Pinnions who died on 15th April 1892 aged 63 years. Her husband William Pinnions died 24th January 1895 aged 60 years.

1912 – 1983 Hempenstall Family

James Hempenstall a Harness Maker who served his time as an apprentice with James Cole in No 6/57 Main St

James Hempenstall died on October 13th 1969 aged 83 years, also his wife Elizabeth died 10th Sept aged 80 years buried in Christchurch graveyard.

In October 1926 Robert Hempenstall Shopkeeper Upper Main St - Son of James Hempenstall married Elizabeth Stedmond – daughter of William Stedmond , Lynwood, Gorey. Present were James Hempenstall, Thomas Seabrooke, & Eleanor Stedmond.

Charles Hempenstall ex RIC brother of James and Robert died 2nd September 1953 buried in Christchurch graveyard. Charles worked with James at the harness making.

In the 1990's Mrs Lucas had a shop here called The "Green Lantern" - The premises is now part of the A.I.B.
