The Flusk Family

The Flusk's are present in Number 45 in 1901 and are a very old Gorey Family with many branches involved in different businesses.

A branch of The Flusks were in Wexford town as well.

The Flusk's have a family vault in St. Michael's Cemetery; Gorey.

In the census of 1901: Michael J. Flusk is recorded as the head of the family and is listed as a publican.

In 1901 he is not married. The Flusks are renting the property from the Bates Family and then from David Beddy; Coach builder.

His sister Margaret and brother John are also listed in the property. Next door in the house is Mary Webster (house situated on North Parade).

In later years the house of Mary Webster was incorporated into Browne's Pub when it was changed into a lounge as an extension to the pub.

The French Family are recorded as running the pub between 1901 and 1911.

Julia French is recorded as dying here in No. 45 in 1909.

They only stay here for a number of years; before they move down the Main Street to their Uncle's business and property; where it becomes known as French's the Premier House.

DEATH.

FRENCH—September 26, 1909, at her residence, 45 Main street, Gorey, Julia French, relict of the late Andrew French; deeply regretted by her sorrowing family and friends. R.I.P. Interment takes place on to-morrow (Tuesday), at Toome, after High Mass and Office at Gorey.

By the 1911 census Mary A. Webster is recorded as running the pub as a shop keeper.

In the house & building return she is recorded as “public house”; as usually there was a bar on one side and a grocery shop on the other part of the shop.
