Patrick Byrne born to Michael Byrne and Ann Redmond at Bannpark in the parish of Craanford in or about 1846 as his baptism is not recorded but that of his sister Ellen is recorded. She was living with him in the 1901 census and was 13 years his junior. He married Rose McDonald, a farmer's daughter in Clonegal in 1894. They had no children and he died in Bannpark in 1920 age 74 years. He was described as being an expublican. There is no record of Rose's death.

Peter Cantwell was born and reared on the Main St of Gorey and ran a grocery business with his brother Michael in 94/33 Main St where they were born and raised. [see 33 for family history] Peter Cantwell

married Margaret Whitty. Unfortunately Margaret died in 1923 at 32 years of age and is buried in Craanford with her parents. Peter died in 1955 and is buried in St Michael's Gorey.

Richard Mac Donald was a son of John MacDonald and Margaret O'Toole who had a butcher's shop in Bunclody. Richard was born in 1919 in Arklow where his mother was from but they moved to Bunclody. Richard was married to Julia Power from Waterford in 1947 and they were involved in the Slaney Vale Hotel in Bunclody. They moved to Gorey where Richard worked in Jimmie Blue Redmonds butcher's shop before opening The Central Bar in July 1960. He wore a dickie-bow to avoid messing up a tie and so he picked up the name "Dickie-bow" They sold the Central and bought the Oulart Hotel in Courtown until they retired. Their grandson James Lawless became a TD for Kildare in 2016.
